Liner notes from Liz Diamond's CD "Yesterdays"

It's one of the ironies of the music business: Jazz veteran Liz Diamond is finally making her recording debut at the ripe age of--well, let's just say that her career started in the 1930's, when she was performing as a "song and dance moppet" at Borscht Belt hotels, weddings, and bar mitzvahs. Since then, she has never stopped singing.

Along the way she's earned accolades from such noted jazz artists as David Amram("This is Liz: She's a great singer") and Paul Bley ("Liz is Billie in pancake"). From the Greenwich Village parties and jazz joints of the 50's and 60's, where she once found herself playing bongos with Jack Kerouac, to the great clubs like Reno Sweeny, Freddy's, The Blue Note, and The Village Gate, Liz has remained a favorite of a small but strong band of New York City music fans. And over the years, her voice has gained the weight of authority: the smoky, lived-in sound that enables her to effortlessly lend layers of richness to a number.

Backed here by an ultra-cool quintet of musicians as she sings a dozen classic American pop songs, she is a link to a long-gone era. It's no wonder that she's gained a whole new youthful following that shows up to hear her in small clubs in the East Village. Close your eyes, and she sends you right through a terrific time warp.

A veteran of the Borscht Belt, hotel dining and ball rooms, Bar Mitzvahs and other assorted social events, Liz Diamond has finally made it to the recording studio after many years in the business.

Joined by a quintet of superb sidemen, Diamond applies her considerable experience and panache to a program of 12 romantic ballads, many of which she has likely sung many times before. Consequently, Diamond is able to weave a special intimacy and familiarity into each song. After all the years on the boards, the voice has developed a husky, smoky mature sound. Nonetheless her range is still surprisingly broad and Diamond always stays in tune. She wisely works her sidemen to her advantage, allowing them to emphasize the unique texture of her voice.

The village lost a treasure on January 21st, 2006 when long time 9th Street resident & jazz singer Liz Diamond passed away. We'll never forget the sight of her riding her bicycle down 9th Street, a mask around her neck, oxygen tank in her basket on her way to a gig. Her indomitable spirit lives on.

DION -- BRONX IN BLUE

The wanderer is back and now he's singing the blues. The iconic symbol of fifties street corner soul, Dion, has just released a new disc full of his roots --- country & rhythm & blues. Basically a guitar & vocal affair, Dion shows a good command of the six string and even surprises with some basic but strong licks. The production is clean & simple, bringing to mind the old blues records where guys sat in front of the mike & played. With his voice in fine form, this is, all in all, a good effort & a fun listen.
